University Hospitals Bristol and Weston NHS Foundation Trust (the Trust) is a public benefit corporation authorised by NHS England, the Independent Regulator of NHS Foundation Trusts on 1 June 2008.

We have more than 15,000 staff who deliver over 100 different clinical services across ten different sites, providing care to the people of Bristol, North Somerset and the South West from the very beginning of life to its later stages. We are one of the country's largest acute NHS Trusts with an annual income of over £1,200m.

The Trust provides services in the three principal domains of clinical service provision, teaching and learning, and research and innovation. The most significant of these with respect to income and workforce is the clinical service portfolio consisting of general and specialised services.

For general provision, services are provided to the population of central and south Bristol and North Somerset, around 350,000 patients. A comprehensive range of services, including all typical diagnostic, medical and surgical specialties, are provided through outpatient, day care and inpatient models. These are largely delivered from the Trust's city centre campus and from Weston General Hospital in Weston-super-Mare, with the exception of a small number of services delivered in community settings such as South Bristol Community Hospital. Specialist services are delivered to a wider population throughout the South West and beyond, typically between one and five million people. The main components of this portfolio are children's services, cardiac services and cancer services as well as a number of smaller, but highly specialised services, some of which are nationally commissioned.

As a University Teaching Trust, we also place great importance on teaching and research. The Trust has strong links with both of the city's universities and teaches students from medicine, nursing and other professions allied to health. Research is a core aspect of our activity and has an increasingly important role in the Trust's. The Trust is a full member of Bristol Health Partners, and of the West of England Academic Health Science Network, and also hosts the recently established Collaboration for Leadership in Applied Health Research for the West of England.

As a foundation trust, we have a membership and 29 governors (23 elected and 6 appointed) who hold us and our Board of Directors to account. Over 3,500 people have joined us as members and their input is vital to our work.

Bristol NHS Group

In April 2025, UHBW and North Bristol NHS Trust confirmed the formation of Bristol NHS Group, bringing together two major NHS providers with a shared ambition: to deliver seamless, high-quality, and equitable care for every person across Bristol, Weston, South Gloucestershire, and the wider South West. With a combined workforce of 28,000 and a budget of over £2.1 billion, we are coming together to tackle health inequalities, improve outcomes, and deliver better value for patients, staff, and the public.

Through a Joint Clinical Strategy, Bristol NHS Group will transform the way healthcare is delivered locally for our patients, our people, the population we serve, and the public purse.

Our five priorities as Bristol NHS Group:


Our Strategic Priorities


Our Divisional Structures

Our clinical services are organised and managed in six clinical divisions – Medicine, Surgery, Specialised Services, Women's & Children's, Diagnostic & Therapy Services and Weston. Our clinical divisions are led by a clinical chair, a director of nursing (head of professions for Diagnostic & Therapy Services) and a divisional director who is the most senior manager in the division. We have two corporate divisions: Estates & Facilities, which includes the operational management of our estate and our facilities services as well as strategic and operational capital planning and delivery; and Trust Services, which includes human resources and organisational development, finance, IT, quality and patient safety, Trust secretariat, transformation, strategy and business planning, chief nurse, medical director team, performance and operations, and research and innovation.

Our Clinical Strategy and Joint Clinical Strategy

Our new Clinical Strategy was approved in November 2024, to be delivered alongside our Joint Clinical Strategy with North Bristol NHS Trust. The picture below summarises the four key goals within our strategy, to drive the development and stability of both our specialist, regional and general local services.

Education and workforce

Our people are the most important part of every service we provide. Use of Cannabis Based Medicinal Products

UHBW provides treatment with UK licensed cannabis based medicinal products (CBMP) in line with NHS commissioned pathways for epilepsy and cancer treatment. Licensed CBMP initiated by other NHS providers in line with NHS commissioned pathways may also be continued for inpatients to facilitate ongoing treatment.

UHBW does not initiate treatment of or supply unlicensed CBMP products. Use of a patient's own supply of unlicensed CBMP products (Schedule 2 Controlled Drugs) prescribed by another UK based provider, may be facilitated for self-administration by inpatients if assessed to be clinically suitable, the patient is able to self-administer and the unlicensed CBMP product is in a form that is suitable for use within an inpatient environment.

Description of the location

University Hospitals Bristol and Weston NHS Foundation Trust is one of the country's largest acute NHS Trusts with a budget of over £1,200m and over 15,000 staff delivering over 100 different clinical services.

The Trust **main site** consists of six hospitals in the centre of Bristol with bed-base of approximately 1,041 beds (inpatient and day case):

Bristol Royal Infirmary (BRI), including the Bristol Heart Institute (BHI)

The BRI provides general and acute medicine and surgery, specialist surgery, critical care, trauma and orthopaedics and accident and emergency services. The hospital has approximately 515 inpatient beds (51 of which are for critical care) plus a further 42 day-case beds and a Discharge Lounge containing chairs for patients who no longer need to be on a ward. The Bristol Heart Institute is the centre for cardiothoracic services for the northern part of the South West region.

Bristol Eye Hospital (BEH)

Bristol Eye Hospital is one of the country's leading specialist hospitals. The hospital has approximately 24 ophthalmic consultants supported by a wide range of staff including orthoptists, optometrists, pharmacists and nurse practitioners. The Bristol Eye Hospital offers a daytime emergency assessment and treatment service, 7 days a week. The hospital has 11 inpatient and 16 day-case beds. The BEH is the region's leading ophthalmology centre.

Bristol Royal Hospital for Children (BRHC)

The Bristol Royal Hospital for Children (BRHC) provides a local service for Bristol children and a referral service for specialist care for families across the South West and nationally. The hospital has approximately 178 inpatient beds (including 18 critical care) and 37 day case beds. The only dedicated children's hospital in the South West of England, BRHC is the regional centre for a wide range of specialist paediatric services and is the base for the internationally renowned bone marrow transplant unit. The intensive care unit provides the highest level of specialist paediatric critical care.

Bristol Haematology and Oncology Centre (BHOC)

BHOC provides inpatient and day case chemotherapy treatment and radiotherapy, inpatient oncology and day case oncology, a full range of haematology services (benign and malignant disease), including adult stem cell transplantation (with an on-site apheresis unit) and provides comprehensive care centre for haemophiliacs, as well as comprehensive palliative care based in the BHOC with outreach across the hospital. The hospital has approximately 58 inpatient beds and 33 day case beds.

St Michael's Hospital (StMH)

StMH provide a range of facilities including maternity services (a midwifery led unit and central delivery suite), gynaecology and gynae-oncology, day surgery, children's and adult audiology, ear nose and throat outpatients and clinical genetics. The hospital is a regional referral unit for high-risk pregnancies, surgical, cardiac and extreme premature neonatal care, and for foetal medicine. The hospital has approximately 125 beds (including 103 maternity/obstetrics, 31 neonates and 22 gynaecology).

University of Bristol Dental Hospital (BDH)

BDH provides routine and specialist clinical dental services for all ages, for the South West of England, as well as conducting research. The hospital also provides Emergency Dental Services for patients with specific life-threatening dental conditions. There are four day-case beds within the hospital to provide dental treatment for paediatric patients who require general anaesthetic.

Critical Care Ambulance Retrieval Services

Southwest Neonatal Advice and Retrieval (SoNAR), Wales and West Acute Transport for Children (WATCh), and Retrieve, are the Services responsible for transferring critically ill patients across the Southwest of England. WATCh also provides cover for hospitals in South Wales. SoNAR is the service commissioned for transfers of babies in or out of a neonatal unit, WATCh provide paediatric critical care transport, and Retrieve is responsible for providing adult critical care transfers. The three Services operate out of a shared base in Bristol, with Retrieve and SoNAR also having bases in Launceston and Plymouth respectively.

Temporary arrangements

Additional temporary arrangements are in place or being sought for the following at additional premises:

- Imaging The radiology service at Weston has been utilising Practice Plus at Emerson's Green to support the elective recovery for non- obstetric ultrasound imaging. This arrangement is expected to be ongoing until 31/03/2026.
- Alveolar bone graft surgery Treating children who require alveolar bone graft surgery.
 A temporary arrangement is currently in place with The Spire Hospital Bristol due to
 consultant sickness and a review into processes regarding Alveolar Bone Grafting at
 BRCH. The contract commenced in May 2023 and is expected to last until March 2026.
 It is anticipated that 2-4 patients will be treated at The Spire each month.
- Paediatric outpatients UHBW Education & Research Centre with the need to expand our Emergency Department within level 3 of The Bristol Royal Hospital for Children, part of level one of the Research & Education centre was repurposed in December 2024 to accommodate paediatric outpatient. 'Fairground' outpatients encompasses; 8 clinic rooms, a phlebotomy room, locked clinical room for drugs, a dirty utility and a reception area. Bathrooms for patients and baby changing facilities are situated on the ground floor opposite. It holds many of the paediatric specialty clinics except for Cardiology, Burns and plastics and Trauma and Orthopaedics who remain onsite at BRHC due to the imaging and radiology support needed. The department is planned to

accommodate paediatric clinics for a further two years, prior to a large expansion of a purpose-built paediatric Outpatient facility.

UHBW provides day surgery (21 day case beds), endoscopy, a wide range of outpatient clinics for adults and young people, MRI and CT scanner facilities and an outpatient adult rehabilitation service. UHBW also provides a community and teaching dental service. Other patient services at SBCH are run by Sirona care & health, including an urgent care centre for minor illnesses and injuries, and two inpatient wards.

The Central Health Clinic also hosts the Avon Breast Screening Service, chronic pain services (Pain Clinic) and the Sexual Assault Referral Service ('The Bridge'). CHC is registered with the CQC to carry out early medical terminations of pregnancy through the UHBW Pregnancy Advisory Service.
